


Five-finger discount:- to steal something, especially from a store.



Aman Sir English


Eg:- The store has added extra security to prevent customers from taking items with a five-finger discount.

Eg:- Veena is very sharp and clever and is really nobody's fool.


Beside the mark: something is irrelevant or not to the point of the main topic being discussed.

Eg:- Anand personally believes in the motto, "When life gives you lemons, make lemonade."

Turn a deaf ear :- to ignore what someone says

Eg:- Please do not just turn a deaf ear to their cries for help.

A bad patch: - A period of difficulty

Eg:- Shami is going through a bad patch at the moment because his wife wants a divorce.


Straight shooter: - A thoroughly upright straightforward person

To bring to light: - to discover or make something known to the public.

Easy does it: Used to tell someone to do something slowly and carefully.




Aman Sir English

Eg:- When lifting heavy boxes, he reminded himself, easy does it, so he wouldn't injure himself.

Penelope's web: - a work which seems to be going on and yet never comes to an end.

Eg:- Every day, I work on this manuscript, and every night, my boss tells me to redo most of it. It's becoming like Penelope's web.

Hit the roof:- To become very angry

Eg:- When the referee disallowed his goal, he hit the roof and was given a red card.

Creature of habit: One who does same thing in the same way

Eg:- My father's such a creature of habit - he always has to have a biscuit and a cup of tea at bedtime.

Henpecked husband:- a woman who is being a nag to a man.

Eg:- I have witnessed numerous husbands being henpecked by their wives.

At a low ebb: in a bad or weak state



Eg:- I was recently divorced and feeling at a very low ebb.

Off and on: - occasionally

Eg:- He worked off and on as a bicycle messenger, but he never found permanent work.

Jaundiced eye:- to view something with prejudice, usually in a cynical or negative way.

Eg:- He seems to have/take a very jaundiced view of life.

A rainy day:- A time when money might unexpectedly be needed



Eg:- She had saved some money for a rainy day.

Let the dust settle: To wait for a situation to become clear or certain



Eg:- After the argument, they decided to let the dust settle before talking again.

turn one's nose up:- to refuse to accept something because you feel that it is not good enough for you

Eg:- She turned up her nose at the job because she didn't think it had enough status


Tip of the iceberg:- to only know a very small part of the problem

Eg:- These small local protests are just the tip of the iceberg.

Keep one's card close to one's chest:- to keep your plans, intentions, or thoughts hidden from others

Eg:- The coach advised the football team to hold their cards close to their chests so that their opponents would not get to know their plan.

Play ducks and drakes:- to use recklessly

Eg:- He lost his job for playing ducks and drakes with the fund of corporation.

Get out of hand:- to become difficult to control

Eg:- It was the end of term and the children were getting a little out of hand.

Actions speak louder than words:- what you do is more important than what you say

Lead someone by the nose:- to control someone and make them do exactly what you want


Eg:- The project has been given funding for another year, but it's not out of the woods yet.

Eg:- It took a few weeks of bed rest, but I'm in the pink of health now.


Lock, stock and barrel:- including all or every part of something:

Eg:- We had to move our things lock, stock, and barrel to the other side of the country.

On tentherhooks: - worried or nervous about something that is going to happen:

Eg:- We've been on tenterhooks since the election results started coming in.

Cut to the quick:- to hurt someone's feelings a lot

Eg:- His heartless comments cut her to the quick.

Square peg in a round hole:- a person whose character makes them unsuitable for the job or other position they are in:

Eg:- How he got the job I will never know. He's like a square peg in a round hole.

Keep the wolf from the door. :- to have sufficient money to prevent starvation or hunger

Eg:- Extreme poverty made the poor woman wonder how long she could keep the wolf from the door.

Put the cart before the horse. :- to do things in the wrong order

Eg:- The government put the cart before the horse by investing heavily before making major reforms.

Speaks volumes :- gives enough proof



Eg:- His success at such a young age speaks volumes for his talent.

Swollen-headed:- thinking that you are more intelligent or important than you really are:

In the running:- in contention for an award, victory, or a place in a team.
