- Q. During a total lunar eclipse, the earth comes between the sun and the moon, blocking direct sunlight from striking the lunar surface. However, not all sunlight is blocked. Only the bluer light is filtered out; the redder light is scattered by the earth's atmosphere, giving the moon its striking colour.
- **R.** The moon will take on a dark red-copper hue. This is the result of a physical effect called Rayleigh scattering.
- S. This is why earth sky appears blue: it has the shortest wavelength in visible light. During a blood moon, however, the bluer light is absorbed by the earth's atmosphere while the redder light is refracted towards the moon.
